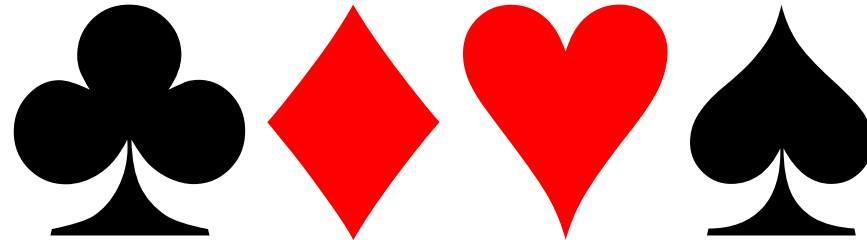

We have already covered hand evaluation, the opening bid, responder's first bid and opener's rebid. This session wraps up the 1suit and 1NT openings.



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Week 15 Responder's rebid

Showing preference

Sequences below omit the passes by the overcalling pair.

Often the first 3 bids bidding will each be a different suit. Eg:

1♥ → 1♠ → 2♦ O=12..19 HCP, L5+♥, L4+♦, L3-♠
R= 6+ HCP, L4+♠, L3-♥

In other words Responder doesn't have a fit in ♥ and offers an alternative, ♠, which opener doesn't like either.

If Responder is not strong enough to make game likely, say 9- HCP, then he probably wants to sign off. Normally it is best to return to the first suit bid by opener:

1♥ → 1♠ → 2♦ → 2♥

Always return partner to his first suit, unless you hold **two more cards** in his second suit than in his first suit.

Showing preference

Always return partner to his first suit, unless you hold **two more** cards in his second suit than in his first suit.

The 2 more cards reflects the principle that length is better than strength.

Preference is often given on a doubleton, sometimes less, and **never** promises any extra points. It is merely a correction of the contract.



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Week 15 Responder's rebid

Game going hands

With 10+ points, you want to do more than just show preference.

- 1) **Support partner.** Show 10+ HCP and 8 card fit with first suit with a **jump** bid back to partner's first suit. (Use the **stop** card!)
- 2) **Rebid your suit.** Show 10+ HCP and L6+ in your suit by rebidding it.
- 3) **Bid NT.** NT responses are the same as R's first bid except a jump to 3NT is not a pudding raise, but is natural, showing 13..15 HCP.

If your pair has bid 3 suits, and you now bid NT, you are **promising two stoppers** in the unbid suit.

- 4) **Bid the fourth suit.** **Fourth suit forcing.**

This **forces** partner to make another bid and **denies two stoppers** in the unbid suit.



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Fourth suit forcing

If you, as Responder, use fourth suit forcing, you need enough points to cope with whatever your partner bids next. 11+ HCP at the 1 or 2 level and 13+ at the 3 level.

You promise nothing about the length of the fourth suit, it is a *gadget*, and you may have L1suit4 or L5suit4!

At the 1 & 2 level, the bid is a general enquiry only and you may have no high cards in the fourth suit.

At the 3 level your partner will expect one stopper in the fourth suit.

Your partner then **must** describe his hand some more.

If you know game is a viable target, but don't know the suit/NT yet, you know your partner **will respond** to this **4SF** bid, so investigation can continue.

Responding after a reverse

A reverse is where the bidding is such that in order to show preference for Opener's first suit, Responder has to bid at the 3 level.

1♥ → 1♠ → 2♦ → 2♥ Not a reverse

1♥ → 2♣ → 2♦ → 2♥ Not a reverse

1♥ → 2♣ → 2♠ → 3♥ A reverse

1♦ → 1♠ → 2♥ → 3♦ A reverse

Opener:

In order to reverse, O must have 16+ HCP and more cards in suit1 than in suit2.

With 12..15 HCP, [do not reverse](#), just rebid first suit.



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Week 15 Responder's rebid

Responding after a reverse

Because Opener has reversed, Responder knows he has 16+ points.

With a weak hand (8..9 Pts):

- a) Show preference at the 3 level to suit1 or suit2 as appropriate;
- b) With 2 stoppers in unbid suit, bid 2NT;
- c) With L6+ in your suit & dislike for both O's suits, rebid your L6suit.

With a stronger hand (10+ Pts):

- a) Jump support (4 level) one of O's suits;
- b) Jump rebid your L6+suit;
- c) 3NT with 2 stoppers in unbid suit;
- d) With only 1 stopper, use Fourth suit Forcing.

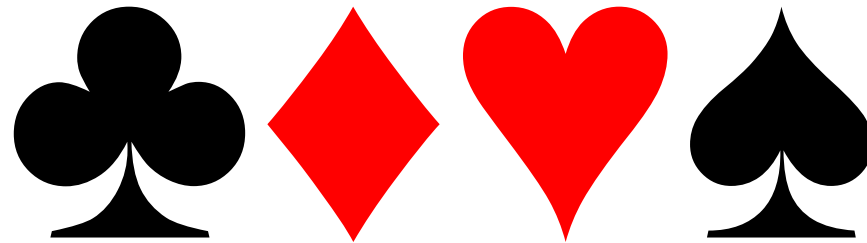
