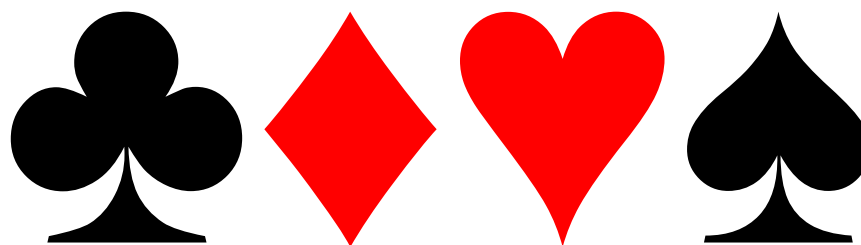

**Nothing new this week – just a revision of existing material.**

### **Jump Shift**

A change of suit and a jump over partner's last bid. It must be reserved for hands with Slam potential.

The Jump Shifter rebid sets the suit – no argument.

Jump Shift is forcing to game. Invitational to slam.

### **Quantative bidding**

Quantative bidding helps decide if a NT slam is viable.

It is not a convention, but a natural bid of 4NT after partner's NT bid.

Do we have enough HCP for 6NT? Maximum 6NT, minimum Pass.



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## Week 13 Slam Bidding part 3

### Blackwood

Blackwood **asks** partner how many aces they have

Is a slam viable? Ask partner how many Aces they have.

- After a suit bid (not a NT bid) by partner
- And you KNOW what suit a slam might be played in
- And you know there are enough points to make a slam plausible
- And you have NO VOID.
- And (between you) you have first or second round control of all 4 suits

Response is: 5♣ = 0/4 Aces; 5♦ = 1 Ace; 5♥ = 2 Aces; 5♠ = 3 Aces.

If sufficient Aces, bid the slam, otherwise retreat to agreed suit at lowest possible level.

Do not use Blackwood if the wrong reply takes you past the opt-out bid.



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## Week 13 Slam Bidding part 3

### Cue bidding

Cue bidding **tells** partner what you have.

- After explicitly agreeing a suit, then a suit bid at the lowest level is a cue bid. “I have first round control of this suit.” (Ace or void).
- Any lower suits that are skipped say I do NOT have first round control of those suits.
- You do not cue bid the agreed trump suit. Sign off with a bid in the trump suit.
- The player starting Cue bidding should **normally** have the Ace of trumps.
- Blackwood can be used after Cue bidding.
- If first round control has been dealt with, a cue bid in that suit is second round control (King or singleton).



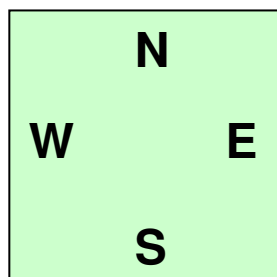

Hand 1 (Cue bid)

♠ A J 9 8 7  
 ♥ K Q 3  
 ♦ A K Q  
 ♣ 5 4



♠ K Q 4 2  
 ♥ A 8  
 ♦ 10 8 5  
 ♣ Q J 7 6

W	N	E	S
1S	P	3S	P
4D (1)	P	4H (2)	P
4S (3)	P	P	P

(1) FRC♦, denies FRC♣.

(2) FRC♥.

(3) Opt out.

No club control, so opt out into 4S, leaving space for East to show FRC♣. (Hence do not show SRC♦).



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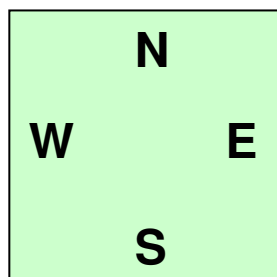

Hand 1 (Blackwood)

♠ A J 9 8 7  
 ♥ K Q 3  
 ♦ A K Q  
 ♣ 5 4



♠ K Q 4 2  
 ♥ A 8  
 ♦ 10 8 5  
 ♣ Q J 7 6

Blackwood usage says “(between you) you have first or second round control of all 4 suits”. No club control, so Blackwood is unsuitable.

But is used, you want two aces as a reply. You have opted out one level higher than with Cue bidding.



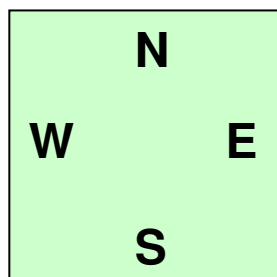

Hand 2 (similar) (Cue bidding)

♠ A J 9 8 7  
 ♥ K Q 3  
 ♦ A K Q  
 ♣ 5 4



♠ K 10 4 2  
 ♥ A 8  
 ♦ 10 8 5  
 ♣ A J 7 6

W	N	E	S
1S	P	3S	P
4D	P	4H	P
4S (1)	P	5C (2)	P
5D	P	5S (3)	P
6S (4)	P	P	P

- (1) Opt out.
- (2) Restart showing FRC♣.
- (3) Opt out.
- (4) One ♣ loser and iffy trumps, but go for it.

Using Blackwood is again improper,  
 but you would be lucky with 2 aces here.



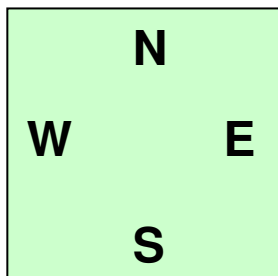

 ♣ A K Q



♠ 9 7

 ♦ A 9 7 2  
 ♣ 9 8 7 4

W	N	E	S
2D	P	4D	P
4NT (1)	P	5H (2)	P
6D	P	P	P

(1) Has FRC or SRC in each suit. 0 or 1 Ace will allow play in 5D. 2 or 3 Ace will allow play in 6D.  
 (2) 2 Aces

Losing tricks: A♠ only.  
 Should make easily.





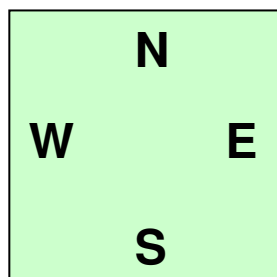

Hand 4 (As Hand 3 but suits swapped) (Blackwood)

♠ 3  
 ♥ K Q 3  
 ♦ A K Q  
 ♣ K Q J 6 5 4



♠ A K 6  
 ♥ 9 7  
 ♦ 9 8 7 4  
 ♣ **A** 9 7 2

W	N	E	S
1C (1)	P	3C	P
3D (2)	P	3S (2)	P
4NT	P	5H (3)	P
6C	P	P	P

- (1) Can't open 2C.
- (2) Minor suit stopper showing trial bid.
- (3) 2 Aces.

Losing tricks: AH only.  
 Should make easily.

But what if E had replied 5D = 1 ace? You still have to bid 6C and go down.



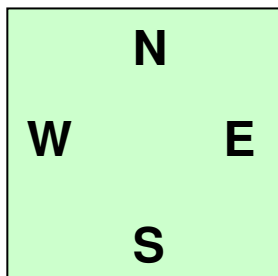

♠ A J 9 8 7  
 ♥ K Q 3  
 ♦ 5 4  
 ♣ A K Q



♠ K Q 4 2  
 ♥ A 8  
 ♦ Q J 7 6  
 ♣ 10 8 5

W	N	E	S
1S	P	3S	P
4C (1)	P	4H (2)	P
5C (3)	P	5S	P
P	P		

(1) FRC♣.

(2) FRC♥, Denies FRC♦.

(3) SRC♣.

(4) Opt out.

No diamond control.

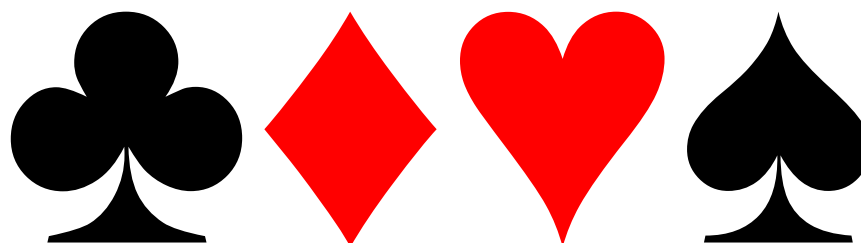
