



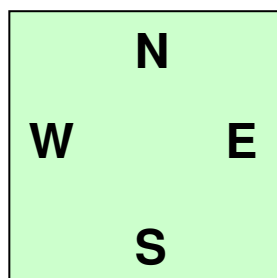

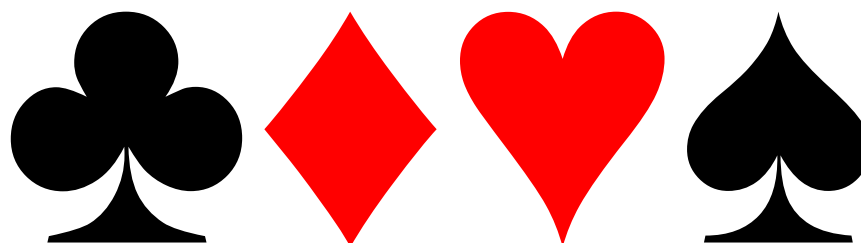

Please be here at least 5 minutes early so we can start play on the dot of 2pm. If you think that will be difficult, get here 15 minutes early instead.



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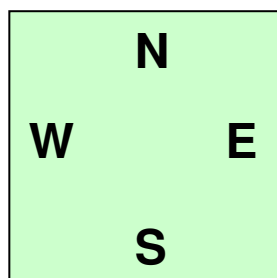

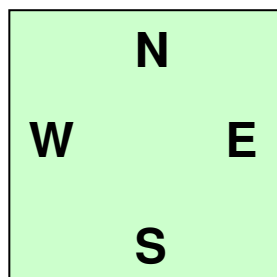

(a) 18HCP + L0♣.

(b) It is a conventional bid, meaning a solid long (L7+) minor headed by at least **AKQJ**. Nothing elsewhere. Can assume to be 7 tricks.

So what does S bid?

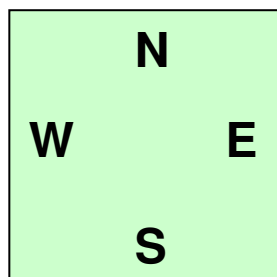

Your partner, N, has promised 7 tricks in a minor suit.

You have 5 tricks ♠AK ♥AK ♦A. So N must have ♣AKQJ.

Grand total 12. But with a void in clubs, you can't get to N's hand to make the tricks – unless clubs are trumps. Bid a club slam.

AR's book bids 7♣. This can be achieved by trumping with the lower clubs.

Overcalls

Often overcalls are weak.

Overcall with a strong suit, even if a weak hand. If partner has some kind of fit, you may win the contract, [keeping the opponents from finding their fit.](#)

Overcalls may be sacrificial – good scores can result that way.

Overcalls may not gain the contract, but can still suggest a good lead to your partner.



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Week 4 Summary part 3

Simple Overcall

At the one level, bid a high quality L5+ suit with 2+ honours ([AK][KQJT]...) and 8+ points.

At the two level, bid a high quality long suit with 2+ honours ([AK][KQJT]...) and enough points.

Either L6+ with 10+ or L5+ with 12+
(*No fear says L5+ with 11+ points*).

Prefer favourable vulnerability overcalls.

Use "SQOT"* : suit length + number of honours in suit = maximum bid level. (eg L5 with 2h = 7 = 1level. Not good enough for a 2 level bid.)

(* Suit Quality Overcall Test – this is not in RWPB, but is in Andrew Robson Books.)



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Week 4 Summary part 3

Simple Overcall

The main reason for overcalling is to obstruct your opponents.

The more obstructive, the weaker you can be.

Bidding a weak 1♥ over 1♠ is not really obstructive, while 1♠ over 1♦ is – removing both majors as 1 level responses – perhaps forcing responder to bid the 1NT “nothing better” bid.

Overcalling 2♣ is similar.



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Week 4 Summary part 3

Responding to a simple overcall.

With a weak hand (9- HCP), bid to the level of the fit. (*Bid to make the number of tricks that you have trumps between you.*)

Often this means you have to Pass.

With a good hand (10+HCP and L4+fit): **Bid opponents' suit at lowest level. This is forcing.** The **Unassuming Cue Bid**.

After the UAB, partner re-bids his suit at the lowest level if he is minimum.

If you have a NT type hand, respond as you would to opener but with 4 HCP more. (Thus 1NT is 10-13 not 6-9).

Rarely change suit. A long high quality suit. Often you will have L2+ weak cards in partner's minor suit and a quality L5+ major suit of your own.



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Week 4 Summary part 3

Jump overcall.

A jump overcall shows a high quality L6+ suit. With 11..15 HCP (2 level overcall) or 12..16 HCP at the 3 level.

Pre-emptive overcall

A **double jump** shows L7+ suit with 10- HCP.

1NT overcall

16..18 HCP reasonably balanced **with 2+ stoppers** in opponents' suit(s).

With a long **solid** suit (eg AKQJxx) you can reduce to only needing 1 stopper in their suit. *(You win with your stopper then win all (say) 6 of your long suit.)*



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Week 4 Summary part 3

Unusual NT Overcall.

I think this is new material – correct me if we’ve already looked at it.

There are 3 **natural** NT overcalls:

1NT

2NT in the “protective position”

– *To Be Discussed, RWPB page 170*

3NT over an opening pre-empt.

All other NT overcalls are “**unusual**” and show L5+, L5+ in the two lowest ranking unbid suits. It asks partner to show preference between them.

If you have already passed, an overcall of 1NT would be unusual.



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Week 4 Summary part 3

Unusual NT Overcall.

Examples (their bids in parentheses):

(1S) 2NT showing

P (1H) P (1S)
1NT showing

(1H) P (4H) 4NT showing

(1D) P (1S) 2NT showing

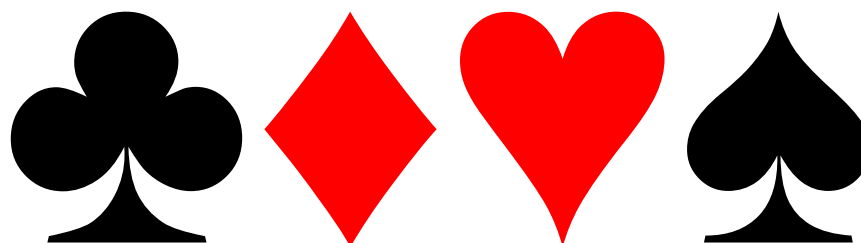
