

## Week 5 Fourth Suit Forcing

### **Fourth Suit Forcing**

Often, with apparent misfits, Opener/Responder/Opener bid three different suits as their first 3 bids.

Normally, Opener is showing L5+OSuit1 and L4+OSuit2, while Responder is showing L4+RSuit1.

Responder didn't support OSuit1 on his initial response as he didn't have a L4 fit. Sometimes, with an L3OSuit1, he will know of a fit at his second rebid, and sometimes not.

Even if responder has an L4RSuit2, he will not to want to explore a fit in this 4<sup>th</sup> suit. Indeed, with a good RSuit2 he tends to NT contracts.

But what if Responder has enough points to bid game, but has a poor RSuit2 and so doesn't feel 3NT suitable? He assumes that the two suits bid already by Opener are ok for 3NT - because they were bid by Opener. But now needs to know if Opener has a stopper in the remaining suit. This is when he uses Fourth Suit Forcing.

## Week 5 Fourth Suit Forcing

**Fourth Suit Forcing** is a bid of the fourth suit and asks Partner to describe his hand "some more". 90% of the time it is asking "Do you have a stopper in the fourth suit as I do not".

This bid of the fourth suit does not show that suit and so is alertable. It is forcing to Game. Do not use without Game values.

The recommended replies for Opener describing **more** about his hand:

- 1) With L3RSuit1, raise it. (Extra length.)
- 2) With L5OSuit2, raise it. (Extra length.)
- 3) With L6OSuit1, raise it. (Extra length.)
- 4) Bid NT with a stopper in the fourth suit but no extra length.
- 5) With a good L2RSuit1, raise it. (Confused with description 1.)
- 6) With a good L5OSuit1, raise it. (Confused with description 3.)

Show extra length first.

Show NT possibilities.

Show good suits.

Don't forget to bid on until Game is reached.

## Week 5 Fourth Suit Forcing

After 1H - 1S - / 2C - 2D! Opener would bid:

S:Q85 H:AK982 D:5 C:QJ75 2S Extra length in RSuit1.

S:Q H:KQ982 D:A5 C:KQ863 3C Extra length in OSuit2, 5:5.

S:85 H:AJT92 D:KQ C:QJ86 2NT No extra length, but a

stopper in the fourth suit D.

S:KQ H:AJT92 D:85 C:QJ86 2S No extra length, no D

stopper, but a good L2RSuit1.

S:KQ H:AQT972 D:8 C:QJ86 2H Extra length in OSuit1.

S:AQ5 H:AK982 D:5 C:QJ75 #3S Extra length in RSuit1.

The jump shows 16+Pts.

Note that all the above have L5+H (OSuit1) and L4+C (OSuit2), so there are only 4 cards remaining to place.



## Week 5 Showing Preference

### **Showing Preference**

Sometimes with a weak hand, it proves better to play in a Part-score contract than in Game.

Exactly what happens depends on your Joint Point-count.

You may only have 6Pts but if your Partner has 19Pts that is 25 JPts (Joint Points), enough to bid a major or NT Game.

What level is wise to bid to?

Minimal (Showing preference - promises nothing extra)?

Game invitational? (More points.)

Game? (Game points even if Partner is minimum.)

Sometimes your evaluation will be on a border. In that case look at the raw hcp to decide whether to nudge "up" a bid or "down" a bid.

### **Showing Preference**

Opener bids a Suit	1H	1219Pts, L4+H
Responder replies	1S	6+Pts. L4+S. L3-H or would have supported the H major.
Opener rebids	2C	L5+H, L4+C, L3-S or would have supported the S major.

So at this point we have an apparent misfit.

Opener:	S:xxx	Responder:	S:XXXX
	H:XXXXX		H:xxx
	D:?		D:?
	C:XXXX		C:?

XX = at least this many cards. xx = at most this many cards.

If Responder really has L3H, he now knows of a fit & can re-evaluate his hand and bid 2H, or even 3H or 4H, depending upon his Pts.

### **Showing Preference**

1H (-) 1S (-) / 2C

But what if Responder only has L2H & Opener happens to have L2S?

Opener: S:XX Responder: S:XXXX

(5431) H:XXXXX (4432) H:XX

D:XXX D:XXXX C:XXXX

Now there are no fits. There is little point in showing the L4D, a useful fit there is unlikely.

Now is the time to show preference.


UNLESS SecondSuit is 2+ longer than FirstSuit, prefer to go with the FirstSuit which is longer in Opener's hand. Here, S are not worth a rebid, so you chose between Opener's H & C. With L2H & L3C, bid 2H.

{S} knows of no fits (there are none). Therefore he just shows preference for one of Opener's suits. A rebid at the lowest level promises no extra points.

{S} has L2H and L2D, so he chooses Opener's FirstSuit and bids 2H.



Note that the first 3 bids are each of a different suit here, so this is a situation where Fourth Suit Forcing might be contemplated.

However,  $\{S\}$  only \_knows\_ of  $12 + 6\frac{1}{2} = 18\frac{1}{2}$ Pts. This is not enough for a game forcing bid, so 4SF can't be used.

### Week 5 Reverse

#### Introduction to a Reverse

When you open 1Suit, it has a wide point-count range: 12..19Pts\*, this covers an 8Pt range.

One of the things that you would like to do, is to let your partner (Responder) know which half of that you are in.

Are you 12..15Pts or 16..19Pts, both covering a 4Pts range.

One method for doing that is the Reverse.

If you make a "Reverse bid", then you are telling partner that you have a strong hand (16..19Pts).

Of course that means that if you do not have a strong hand, having only 12..15Pts, then the "Reverse bids" are unavailable to you.

<sup>\* 1</sup>C is 12..19..22 because a "Strong 2C" isn't available. 2C being used for the Acol superstrong 23+ bid. 1C has to cover a strong hand too.

Let's look at that "Showing Preference" pair of hands again, but this time swapping the two red suits...

{S} knows of no fits (there are none). Therefore he just shows preference for one of opener's suits. A rebid at the lowest level promises no extra points.

{S} has L2H and L2D, so he chooses Opener's FirstSuit and bids <del>2D</del> oh!!! 3D.



### Week 5 Reverse

#### Reverse

Because of the order of bidding the suits this time, to show preference, {S} has to bid at the 3:level. {S} may only have 6Pts for his 1:level response, so if {N} has just 12Pts then the 3D preference bid is a step too far.

This is "fixed" by requiring Opener to have more points (16+) when he bids with suits in an order that forces Responder to show preference of the first suit at the 3:level.

There are only about a dozen sequences that this applies to, but each case is easy to determine.

If Opener's rebid is above 20Suit1, then showing preference may be a problem.

(It won't be a problem if Responder isn't weak, but then it is unlikely to be "Showing Preference". And it won't be a problem if Opener is strong either.)



### Week 5 Reverse

#### What is a Reverse?

When you open 1Suit, imagine a barrier created at 2Suit.

A Reverse is a non-jump rebid of a new suit above the "barrier" with a strong hand (16..19Pts) and a longer first suit than second suit. (If the two suits are equal length, you just open the higher ranking first. There are surprisingly few reverses possible.)

### Example of Opener's rebid:

```
1D - 1S - 2C 2C is below the barrier of 2D. Not a reverse.
```

- 2D 2D is not a new suit. Not a reverse.
- 2H 2H is above the barrier of 2D. A reverse.
- 2S 2S is not a new suit. Not a reverse.

### A complete list of Opener's Reverses in Acol.

A non-jump bid of a new suit above this barrier is a reverse and shows a strong hand (16..19Pts) and a shorter OSuit2 than OSuit1.

```

1C - 1S - 2D

1C - 1S - 2H

1D - 1S - 2H

1D - 2C - 2H

1D - 2C - 2S

1H - 2C - 2S

Apparently you can also reverse after a 1NT response.

#### Week 5 Reverse

#### What isn't a Reverse.

If Responder makes a higher bid than a raise of your opening suit, then it isn't a reverse, you have been forced up a level.

This could happen if Responder chooses to make a Jump Shift and shows strength.

1C - #2D - / 2S Although a new suit above 2C, not a reverse.

It can also happen if the opposition intervene with an overcall.

1C (1H) 2D - / 2S Although a new suit above 2C, not a reverse.

### What if you aren't strong enough to Reverse?

Playing a Reverse is a good way of informing Partner about: your strength (16..19Pts)
OSuit1 being longer than OSuit2
and is a non-jump bid.

So what to do if you have L5D and L4H, but only 12..15Pts?

In that case, you can't bid 2H (2OSuit2), and must rebid 2D (2OSuit1).

This is another reason that you need to plan your rebid before making the opening bid.

#### **Autumn Tournament: November 15**

## Week 5 Play

### **Play**

Play as if "Duplicate Pairs".

{NS} have the pair number of their table, {N} has his back to the stage. {EW} have the pair number of their table plus 8.

Play boards in sequence. Have an incoming pile and an outgoing pile. Pass outgoing to next lower numbered table – Table 1 to highest table.

Some boards have instructions on card. The appropriate people should read each card at the time it says and follow its instructions.

If you play a board twice, record the second play on the traveller using your pair numbers PLUS TEN (eg 1 v 9 becomes 11 v 19)

If you wish to fill in a personal results card, they are available here. They are commonly used at duplicate clubs.

Don't forget to describe partner's bids and plays to the table.



Vul Vulnerability (None NS EW All).

Rotn Rotation Defined by one card, usually A♠.

Mostly different to source publication.

Dcl Declarer (NESW)

OL Opening Lead

Trk Tricks (0..13)

NS# EW# Score for NS or EW

NS% EW% Percentage of NS and EW

Ref Reference result (Sometimes there may be more than one)

Blue results as played.

Red results are reference results.

#### **Set hand averages**

Just for amusement sake, here is the average for each pair along with whether they sat NS or EW.

It isn't particularly meaningful as tables played a mix of boards, Table 3 had five players with partnerships that kept changing, and there was no movement between the tables.


